



Background and context

In 2021, the ACU and the British Council partnered to establish the Commonwealth Futures Climate Research Cohort, supporting 26 rising-star researchers to bring local knowledge to a global stage, build international collaborations, and translate research into action in the lead-up to the 26th United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP26).

The cohort convenes researchers with expertise in a range of disciplines, and who have a deep understanding of communities disproportionately impacted by climate change. Reflecting the diversity of the Commonwealth, members the of cohort are based at 25 ACU member universities from 16 countries.


Throughout 2021, the 26 researchers attended a series of expert-led workshops, benefitted from mentorship from senior climate research experts, and designed and delivered their own peer-led research-to-action projects with seed funding. By supporting the development and retention of research leaders, the ACU-British Council partnership works to build a more equitable research landscape, ensuring that university research continues to thrive, inspire action, and play an essential role delivering impactful climate solutions across the Commonwealth.

In 2022, the cohort will be in attendance at COP27 in Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt, to build connections and scope collaborations for climate action.
